

Rector's remarks



#### **God's Promises**

A pril, once we've dodged the showers, is very clearly the month in which it begins to feel like Spring has sprung. Whether it's the blossom on the trees, the early flowers putting forth their beautiful petals, the return of the migratory birds or the washing of the cricket whites laid up over the winter, everything speaks of new life, fresh starts.

This April the entire month is part of the celebration of Easter, that feast which above all others reminds us of the reality of the triumph of life over death, love over fear, hope over despair. The realisation of God's promises that the darkness of all that grinds us down will be swept away in the light of resurrection.

One of the things we'll be reflecting on at church is what Jesus' resurrection – and our promised resurrection – means for how we approach the world around us. Sometimes we've had a simplistic understanding of what the resurrection means – that life after death means the world will fade away and people will live on in heaven. Sometimes that has led to some disastrously wrong attitudes and thinking– not just the 'bring on the apocalypse'-type nihilism which leads some to support war in Israel/Gaza, but also the 'it doesn't matter' approach to using up the world's resources and polluting what is left. It's all earmarked for destruction, so why bother taking care of it?

This past month St Peter's has achieved Bronze EcoChurch status – by complete coincidence, within a few days of Glenfield Methodist Church doing the same – an award which reflects the commitment of the church in all kinds of areas to minimise our negative impact on the created world around us.



Being resurrection-focussed does not mean caring less about

the world God created – in fact it should lead us to be more concerned about a world which God intends to renew and restore. April, Spring, Easter should lead us to enjoy that blossom, those birds, the bat on ball, and care about them more deeply.

#### **Memory Box**

On the 9<sup>th</sup> March St Peter's MU hosted the MU Members 'Spring Forum' for the Leicester Diocese in the Church Centre. The Guest Speaker was Rebecca Panting who is Project Manager for "Saffires" in Leicester. This is a Christian run charity supporting women who are involved or affected by prostitution. Rebecca is a young woman driven by her Faith who gave an excellent informative talk.

After Lunch the MU Trustees updated us on their work and news. The meeting was well attended with over sixty members present.

14<sup>th</sup> March was our Glenfield MU Meeting when Wendy Nye talked about her 'Memory Box' and how small things hold big memories. She brought her box which had three drawers. She took out items one by one and told us their story, below are tales of some of the items. A spare pink dummy reminds her of her daughter who would not part with her dummy even though it was affecting the growth of her teeth. One day in desperation she threw the dummy through the window and told her daughter a bird had taken it away for its babies. The child asked if it was an eagle and was told it was. Years later they went to a falconry display where there was an eagle. She told the children around her that the eagle needed dummies for her babies and the other children left their dummies on the floor in front of it for the eagle's children.

A silver sixpence reminded her of pocket money from her Grandad and memories of the sweet shop, flying saucer sweets, love hearts and cone shaped paper bags. A miniature treadle sewing machine reminds her of her Granny teaching her how to treadle. A beaded orange scarf reminds her of fun learning to belly dance. Post cards and tickets hold memories. A toy Andy Pandy and teddy remind her of her children's childhood.

She encouraged us to have our own Memory Boxes which give great pleasure and are individual in nature. For people who are suffering from Dementia they can be a memory trigger and for children who have lost a parent can be a great comfort.

The next meeting will be on 11<sup>th</sup> April Speaker: Margaret Rouse. 'The Mid-day Prayer'.



#### Sew, Sew



Michelle pointed out some of the differences between machines and how they had progressed and also pointed out how ornate some were. The first machines could only do chain stitch, but with the introduction of shuttles, they became more like the modern machines. Treadle machines were introduced for the first time in the 1920s. Groups of women would band together to buy a machine as they could be expensive. We also learnt the history of the sewing machine.

We saw a picture of the first huge machine from the 18<sup>th</sup> century, but it was not until 1857 that the first machines were patented with three manufacturers competing, Willcox and Gibbs, Singer and Jones, In the end, all three patents were awarded. Jones opened a factory in Manchester while Singer moved to Clydebank where, at their height, they employed 16,000 people and even had their own railway and station. The only other firm to have one was Bournville. They eventually ceased production in the 1990s when the huge 6-storey building was demolished. Jones became a Japanese firm and was renamed Brother. It was a fascinating insight into the history of the sewing machine and was lovely to look at the machines and see how primitive some were but also to admire the gold decoration.

We also enjoyed an outing to Stoneywell Cottage, a National Property in Charnwood Forest, where we were given a guided tour of the house and learnt some of the history of the family and the house. Afterwards, we wandered through the gardens admiring the daffodils and the spectacular rhododendrons. Of course, the visit wouldn't have been complete if we hadn't indulged in some refreshment. Well, we are the WI and have to test the baking!!!! A very rewarding visit.

Next meeting: April 4th and is a quiz evening.

We are also having a meal on April 26th at the Queen Victoria in Syston.

#### St George's Day 23<sup>rd</sup> April

According to Wikipedia, Saint George's Day is the feast day of Saint George, notably England's patron saint, but celebrated also by Christian churches, countries, and regions of which he is the patron saint, including Bulgaria, Ethiopia, Greece, Georgia, Portugal, Romania, Syria, Lebanon, Catalonia, Alcoi, Aragon, and Rio de Janeiro.

The strange thing about St George is that no-one knows who he was, where he came from, or why he was made a saint, and there is no authenticated record of him ever visiting England! It seems that he was not even English, but then, only the English would choose such an unknown entity to be our patron saint!

There is the mythical tale about him saving a village somewhere in Europe from a dragon. I was taught this story when I was a Boy Scout – my troop met in St George's Church in Tarpots, Essex.

An 18<sup>th</sup> Century Georgian geographer and historian Vakhushti Bagrationi once claimed that there are 365 Orthodox churches in Georgia named after Saint George, that's one for every day of the year. In the UK there are 243 churches dedicated to St George, that's 15<sup>th</sup> in the list of church names which is led by St Mary with 2,368 dedications! Probably the best known church in the world that is named after St George is St George's Chapel in Windsor Castle which is privately owned by King Charles III.

Who's afraid of the big bad woof

#### This could make you scream!

Screaming Day on 26 April, raises awareness of the health benefits of screaming out loud. At some point, all of us have benefited from letting out a long howl, whether it was screaming into a pillow, in the car, in an empty room, or in any space where we feel comfortable.

Screaming Day doesn't have a long history or any traditions, but this will likely change in a few years as we learn more about screaming, and our pressure-filled lifestyles compel us to turn to new methods of venting and releasing tension.

Screaming has been considered healing for centuries. Over 2,000 years ago, it was viewed as therapeutic and was supplementary to Eastern medicine. Master of Chinese medicine, Dr Lu, believes that screaming helps with liver stagnation.

Screaming is mentioned in the Bible, for example, Isaiah 13:6 says: Scream in terror, for the day of the LORD has arrived — the time for the Screaming Almighty to destroy.

Primal screaming was designed by Arthur Yanov to process emotions and let it all out with a long howl. There is evidence that screaming taps into deep emotions and brings them to the surface.

While there are benefits to screaming, using it to heal must be done properly, and not in a space that will make others uncomfortable, or even justify bad behaviour towards others under the guise of using screaming to channel emotions. #### Bishop Martyn's Week in the House of Lords



From 11-15 March, Bishop Martyn was the duty bishop in the House of Lords. This role involves saying prayers at the start of each day before parliamentary business in the House of Lords begins. It also means being on hand to respond to urgent business – like ministerial statements or urgent questions.

Bishop Martyn took part in Oral Questions (parliamentary questions that are put to a government minister by a member of the House to respond

to in-person) on every day that the House was sitting. On Monday, Bishop Martyn asked Lord Markham, Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Social Care, whether the Government had assessed the impact of the two-child limit on benefits on the health and wellbeing of children and young people. The two-child limit means that households can only receive child tax credit or the child element of Universal Credit for their first two children, if their third or subsequent children were born after 1 April 2017. It has been described as the one of the biggest drivers of rising child poverty, and if abolished, the Child Poverty Action Group estimate that 250,000 children would be pulled out of poverty overnight. This could have a significant impact here in Leicester, where 2021/22 figures show 2 in 5 children were living in poverty (up from 30% in 2014/15)

On Tuesday, Bishop Martyn asked Lord Evans of Rainow if he agreed that the Government should consider the need for restorative breaks for unpaid carers and the role for employers in supporting unpaid carers to stay in work in a future national care strategy. He referenced the <u>Archbishops' Commission on Reimagining Care</u> which, based on conversations with dozens of unpaid carers, recommended that there should be a 'new deal for carers' including restorative breaks, financial support, and support from employers including paid leave and the right to request flexibility.

Later in the day, he asked Lord Cameron, Secretary of State for Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Affairs, if the Government would revisit the <u>International Development Committee's report</u> on Debt Relief and evidence from the Jubilee Debt Campaign and Make Poverty History, given the 'weighty moral debt' we owe as a country to many lowand middle-income countries which have seen the level of their external debt double since 2010 – reaching \$9 trillion in 2022.

Bishop Martyn also spoke in support of two amendments in the Committee Stage of the Victims and Prisoners Bill. These two amendments, which were co-sponsored by the Bishop of Gloucester, would ensure aftercare, especially psychiatric support, to people imprisoned for public protection (Although IPP sentences were abolished in 2012, thousands of people subject to such a sentence are still in prison, and rates of

rpsychological distress amongst this population are particularly high).

On Wednesday, Bishop Martyn asked Baroness Barran, the Lords Spokesperson for Equalities, if the Government would increase statutory paternity leave in line with other European countries, both in terms of the length of time allowed and the amount of statutory pay, given the proven benefits on family bonds and gender equality. This followed research by Pregnant Then Screwed that of more than 500 new fathers and secondary parents who did not take their full paternity or parental leave allowance, 70% said it was because they could not afford to.

On Thursday, Bishop Martyn raised the issue of Christians' freedom of religion in India with Lord Ahmed of Wimbledon, Minister of State in the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office. He noted that the number of acts of religiously-motivated violence against Christians in India has increased almost every year since 2014 – from 147 to 687 in 2023, and last year, over 500 Christians were arrested under anticonversion laws, including a couple and their pastor during their wedding on the grounds the wedding was a "conversion event". Bishop Martyn asked the minister to condemn this state of affairs and to take steps to defend freedom of religion and belief in India. Lord Ahmed assured Bishop Martyn that the Government was committed to ensuring freedom of religion and belief, and it is hoped that other Lords Spiritual will pursue this matter further in the coming weeks.

#### All that Jazz!

Jazz Appreciation Month, aptly called JAM, is a music festival held every April in recognition of the significant contribution that jazz music has made to society. The organisers say that it: aims to pay tribute to jazz for its historic and cultural significance by encouraging schools, governments, and organisations to participate in various events such as free jazz concerts and educational programs.

JAM was started in 2001 by John Edward Hasse, a curator at the Smithsonian National Museum of American History and it was funded by the Ella Fitzgerald Charitable Foundation, whose archives are housed at the Smithsonian.

In 2012, Smithsonian Folkways Recordings group received permission from the estate of Louis Armstrong to release his recordings on a new album titled *Satchmo*. The release was made at the 2012 annual Jazz Appreciation Month events in the US. Today, it is a worldwide event. Through jazz-focused events, JAM works to support today's jazz scene and encourages an appreciation of jazz music in people of all ages.

Throughout April, people will be encouraged to participate in jazz activities such as studying jazz music, attending jazz concerts, reading books about jazz and its history, or just simply listening to good jazz music – I would recommend Louis Armstrong if you enjoy traditional Jazz, or Dave Brubeck if Modern Jazz is your preference.


