Rector's remarks



## That Reminds Me!

**T**he other day I was reminded of my final day at primary school. I was taking an assembly locally, with 5-year-olds sat at my feet and 11-year-olds at the far end of the hall. Looking at them, I realised firstly that they were the children who were sat at my feet in my first assembly there back in 2016 and secondly that I would never see them in an assembly again. Come September, they will be off on the bus into Anstey or Groby or further afield, to start again at secondary school.

And it took me back to that final day of goodbyes and farewells at St Mark's in Islington, when we stood awkwardly around, with squash and cakes on desks which had been covered in exercise books and pencils or fountain pens – never ever ballpoints – wondering what we were supposed to do. Most children in my school went to the local secondary. I, however, was off somewhere else. Having recently moved house, I was now living close enough to still walk to school each morning, but far enough away that I was in another catchment area. So, while for most of my classmates this was a simple, 'See you in September' moment, for me it was the first, 'I'll probably never see you again' moment I'd had. And I never did, except one of them.

There's something about final goodbyes. Something which is difficult to handle: something within us that rebels against that ending. Most of us face them at some point in life: whether it's through the changing circumstances of life, or the conclusion of death.

It's not long since we marked again in our calendar the events of Easter and then his final ascension into heaven. That final goodbye in which Jesus – thankfully not as clueless as an 11-year-old me – knew exactly what he had to offer his friends: a purpose, to bear witness to the truth about life and God they'd found in him; and a promise, that though separated from him, he would never abandon them, that they'd always know God's presence through the Holy Spirit.

For all of us who face change and challenge this summer, God promises to be with us, wherever we go, however much changes around us.

## New stone grotesques arrive at Leicester Cathedral



Four new stone grotesques have arrived at Leicester Cathedral ready to replace old, weather-worn ones as part of the renovation work. The Leicester Cathedral Revealed project includes the repair and restoration of external stonework on the south face of the building. As part of that work, these new carved creatures will be installed as an integral part of the parapet wall: White Boar; Peregrine Falcon; Wyvern and Leicester Longwool Sheep.

Project Manager for Leicester Cathedral Revealed, Simon Bentley, said: "Whilst it will be late 2023 before all the Cathedral Revealed work is complete, we are making real progress and when these carvings are visible on the building in a few weeks' time, we hope they will be an encouraging sign that our cathedral has an exciting future and will continue to be the beating heart of our city and county."

The grotesques are made of Peak Moor stone from Derbyshire and replace eroded Victorian sandstone ones. They will complement the fox and tiger grotesques installed in 2018.

Skilled stone carvers from Loughborough firm Midland Stone Masonry, who created the fox and tiger grotesques, have carved the new ones, applying a similar style and expression to form a 'family' of grotesques on the south elevation. The fox and tiger were designed by Irish artist Phoebe Cope. The latest four have been designed and carved by skilled sculptor/carver Alan Necchi.

The old, weather-worn gargoyles which were eroding have been removed and are now on the ground. They will be stored safely by the cathedral.

The grotesques are funded with a grant from the Culture Recovery Fund for programmes of major works undertaken by specialist builders and craftspeople on churches and cathedrals. Match funding comes from the National Heritage Lottery Fund and Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme.

Stone carved grotesques are a fascinating feature on many historic buildings and serve to highlight aspects of local culture and history and these new ones will help to reveal the living stories of cathedral and its role as a place of worship, heritage, pilgrimage, hospitality, learning, sanctuary and celebration in Leicester and Leicestershire.

### **Time for a smile**

Heads bowed in prayer, the congregation at our Church listened in complete silence to the Minister as he said, "Now let us pray in the words that Jesus taught us." A little girl's voice could be heard throughout the hushed congregation as she said, "Daddy, I didn't know Jesus had a tortoise."

**The Great I AM**

It's holiday time for many of us and any trip we take at home or abroad requires at least some preparation; passports, currency etc. In the book of Numbers, we read that the Israelites were now in the wilderness at the beginning of their journey to the Promised Land. They had no idea what lay ahead. In the first 10 chapters we are told how God, through Moses, set about preparing his chosen people to become people ready and able to enter the Promised Land. Many times, we read 'The Lord said to Moses...'. Numbers may seem dry reading but preparation, while not the most exciting thing, was essential to get the people ready practically and spiritually for the journey they would be undertaking.

A census was taken so they knew how many active soldiers they had. They were split into tribes and told where to camp. The Levites were authorised to be the priests. Rituals were established and undertaken. Ceremonies were held to remind them of their deliverance from Egypt and to set them apart as God's people. Finally, God's presence dwelt among them continually as a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. In other words, they were being *prepared* for their journey; counted, organised, cleansed, blessed, and made ready to march forward as an organised group with an identity and a purpose. Very different from the group of slaves that escaped from Egypt. God ensured that they had all the tools they needed to make the journey successfully. But in chapter 11, the people started complaining about Moses and his choice of wife, his leadership, the monotony of the food, about Aaron, and the lack of water. Even Aaron complained against Moses. God became angry. In chapter 14 we read:

*'The Lord said to Moses, 'How long will this people spurn me? And how long will they not believe in me, despite all the signs which I have performed in their midst?'*

Unfortunately, instead of being grateful to God for all he had done, they sinned by complaining about everything. Instead of trusting God – after all, he had proved himself faithful in every miracle and provision he gave them – they complained. And that is sin. Finding your creator or his representative at fault isn't a wise thing to do. God takes us through things to strengthen our trust, to build our character and he walks through it all with us.

*Matthew 6:8* tells us that God knows what we need before we ask.

*Philippians 4:19* tells us that God will supply all our needs.

What God won't do is let disobedience and criticism of himself go unnoticed. If you read the latter part of Numbers, you will see that God metered out some pretty shocking punishments to those who complained, such as death by fire or plague. We must never forget that God is the great I AM. He doesn't have to explain himself.

## Recipe of the month:

*Being mainly a meat eater, I am afraid that I sometimes overlook vegan, vegetarian and gluten-free recipes, so this month here is one that, even as a meat-eater, I enjoy, and we often have it at home and serve it at church functions when it is always well received. It is also good if you are trying to lose some weight as it is based on a Weight Watchers collection of vegetarian recipes published in 1977.*

### Spanish Rice (serves two)

#### INGREDIENTS

- ½ tbs olive oil
- ½ onion
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 courgette
- ½ tsp chilli powder
- ½ tsp turmeric
- 4oz long grained rice
- ¾ pint vegetable stock
- 2 tbs dry white wine
- 1 can of chopped tomatoes
- 3oz frozen petit pois
- 3oz kidney beans (the original recipe used black-eyed beans)
- ½ tbs fresh chopped sage or 1 tsp dried sage can be used
- Salt and ground black pepper
- 4 tbs vegetarian Parmesan cheese (or gluten free alternative)  
grated finely

#### METHOD

*Heat the oil in a large frying pan and fry the onion and garlic until softened. Add the courgette and fry for 2 minutes.*

*Stir in the chilli, turmeric, rice, tomatoes, and beans for 2 minutes.*

*Add the stock, wine, tomatoes, and mushrooms and bring to the boil.*

*Reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes.*

*Stir in the peas, sage and seasoning, and simmer for a further 5 minutes or until the rice is tender.*

*Serve immediately and sprinkle on the cheese.*
